About Bangalore

Located on the Deccan Plateau in the south-eastern part of Karnataka, Bangalore is India's third most populated city and the fifth most populated urban agglomeration. Bangalore is well known as a hub for India's Information Technology (IT) sector. It stands out for being among the top 10 preferred entrepreneurial locations in the world.

Bangalore History

The term 'Bangalore' is an anglicized version of "Bengalooru," a Kannada term. The word "Bengalooru" was in turn derived from the phrase 'bendekaaluooru' meaning 'the town of boiled beans'. The story behind naming the city as the 'town of boiled

beans' is said to be a hunting expedition by King Ballalathe 2nd in 1120 of the Hoysala dynasty who lost his way in the jungle. Deep inside the jungle, lived an old woman who took pity on the hungry and tired hunter. The old woman was poor and had nothing else to offer but boiled beans. But the king was so pleased with her hospitality that he named the entire city as 'bele-benda-kalu-ooru'.

Places to visit in Bangalore

Bangalore being an important city right from the reign of Tippu's times and through the ages ruled subsequently by the British, has numerous attractions. Post-independence, new land marks have been added to make the city a very popular tourist destination. Its twin city Mysore has stamped itself as a heritage city, and the combined attraction of both these cities makes it a top tourist destination in south India.

Bull Temple (Dodda Basavanna Temple)

The gigantic image of the celestial bull, Nandi, which stands at 4.57 meters.in height, is a classic example of Dravidian architecture. A yearly festival to celebrate the harvesting of peanuts, (Kallekai parse) is held here during the month of Nov-Dec. This attracts large crowds from all over the state.



Lalbagh Gardens

This expanse of greenery is one of India's most beautiful botanical gardens. It was laid out by Hyder Ali and Tippu Sultan in the 18th century, Within the Gardens there was built by Rev. J. Garrett, who was the is a beautiful lake with a water spread area of 1.5 Sq.Kms dotted with picturesque tiny islands. It is a good picnic spot.

The Government Museum

One of the oldest museums in the country, established in 1886, has a unique collection of sculptures, inscriptions, paintings, icons and also some relics from Mohenjodaro. Museum Timings: 10:00 am to 5:00 pm (Tuesday to Sunday). Monday Closed.

Attara Kacheri (High Court)

"Eighteen offices" is the literal meaning of this very elegant two storied building facing Vidhana far from there is the sprawling Cubbon Park, Vishveshwaraja Museum of Science and Technology and Venkatappa Art Gallery.

Cubbon Park

This beautiful park, which spreads over 300 acres in the heart of the city, serves as the lung space of the evergrowing Banglore city. Designed by Lt. General Sir Mark Cubbon, in 1864, is dotted with beautiful statues, flowering trees, fountains and a library its midst.

Vidhana Soudha

A magnificent building of the Neo-Dravidian style, houses the State Legislature. It was conceived and executed by Kengal Hanumanthaiah, the former Chief Minister of Karnataka in 1956.

Jawaharlal Nehru Planetarium

The sky theater with a dome of fifteen meters in diameter attracts all the amateur astronomers and the commoners to this Planetarium, founded in 1989 to commemorate the birth centenary of Jawaharlal Nehru, the First Prime Minister of India. Indiragandhi Musical Fountain

Another attraction opposite the Planetarium is the musical fountain and its dancing waters.

Bangalore Palace

Bangalore Palace located in Bangalore city was built by Rev. J. Garrett, who was the first Principal of the Central High School in Bangalore, now known as Central College. The construction of the palace was started in 1862 and completed in 1944. In 1884, it was bought by the then Maharaja of Mysore Chamarajendra Wadiyar X. Now owned by the Mysore Royal family, the palace has recently undergone a renovation and must see attraction in Bangalore.



ISKON Temple

The ISKCON provides much more for the soul, than those rituals. ISKCON are centers of spiritual learning through Godly association, where a visitor is inspired to learn more about Spiritual life. There is a magnificent main temple hall, which houses the altars of Their Lordships Sri Radha Krishna-Chandra, Sri Krishna Balarama& Sri Nitai Gouranga. Also one can see the Golden Chandelier that is shaped like an inverted Lotus Flower.



Tippu's Summer Palace

The palace was first a mud-brick defence built by Kempegowda in 1537. Hyder Ali and his son Tippu Sultan later rebuilt it 1791. The two-storied structure (replica of the Daria Daulat in Srirangapatnam) served as Tippu's summer retreat, which he endearingly called lask-e-jannat (the envy of heaven). An inscription on the wooden Gavi Gangadhareshwara Temple screen describes the palace as the 'abode of happiness', almost mocking the ruins that surround it.



Sankey Tank

Sankey Tank is one of the ideal places to spend a relaxed day in Bangalore. The tank Bengaluru's former prison, the Central Jail is situated in a convenient location in the western part of the city. It is in the middle of the suburbs of Malleshwaram, Vyalikaval and Sadashiva Nagar. The lake is spread across an area of 37.1 acres. At its widest the tank has a width of 800 m or 2624.7 ft. The large water body is a source of attraction for the locals as well as the tourists coming to Bangalore.

Visvesvaraya Industrial & Technological Museum

This splendid museum, dedicated to the memory of Bharat Ratna M. Visvesvaraya, the architect of modern Karnataka, houses various technical inventions and offers you a glimpse of the history of technological development in the country. A major attraction here is a 1:1 scale replica of the Wright Brothers' Flyer, the World's first piloted aircraft and a 'Flyer Simulator' that offers a delightful experience to visitors. At the Dinosaur Corner, one can also witness the movement and sound of a lifesized animated Spinosaurus in a recreated environment.

Karnataka Chitrakala Parishath

Home to paintings by artists such as Nicholas Roerich, Svetoslav Roerich, Srikanta Shastry Kukke, H K Kerjriwal and Krishna Reddy among others, Chitrakala Parishath is a must visit for every art lover. One of the leading fine arts institutions in These paintings are neatly spread across, the country, the Chitrakala Parishath hosts numerous activities including performances, folk theatre, photography exhibitions, puppet shows and musical recitals. It also houses five art galleries which are hired out to artists who wish to showcase their work. It also houses the Chitrakala Vidyalaya, a college of fine arts offering courses in painting, sculpture, graphic art, applied art, etc.

HAL Heritage Centre and Aerospace Museum

HAL Heritage Centre and Aerospace Museum was established by Hindustan Aeronautics Limited. The museum displays a varied collection of aircraft models, fighter planes and helicopters. The museum also houses a reference library, aircraft simulators, a mock air traffic control tower and an aero modeling club.

Shiva Temple

A 65 ft Shiva statue adorns this temple along with an artificial pond resembling the ManasaSarovar Lake, several caves and replicas of Jyothirlingas.

Adorned with a granite moon, sun-disc monoliths, a stone umbrella, a Shivalinga and three cave passages, this unique temple was built during the reign of Kempegowda. During Makara Sankranthi, every year, a ray of light passes between the horns of a stone bull and illuminates the deity placed inside the cave.

Ragigudda Sri Prasanna Anjaneya Swami Temple

This Hanuman Temple is located on a hillock named Ragigudda (literally translated as maize mountain). The special attractions here are three rocks representing the Hindu trinity - Brahma, Vishnu and Shiva. Over and beyond its purpose as a place of worship, it also serves as a cultural, educational and social service project.

Freedom Park (former Central Jail)

has been revamped and reformed as a park in an area of about 21 acres. Inaugurated to the public in November 2008, the park has a library, museum, joggers' stretch, amphitheater, a children's play area and a part of it has been dedicated for holding protests/ public meetings. There is also a cafeteria as well as ample of parking space.

National Gallery of Modern Art

For an art lover, the National Gallery of Modern Art is perhaps a one stop halt in Bangalore to see contemporary modern paintings made by the celebrities of the by gone era. It is housed in a two story building and carries paintings of Jamini Roy, AAmritaShergill, Raja Ravi Verma and the Nobel Laureate RabindraNath Tagore. the corridors of the art gallery, in tiny rooms and in the large central hall. It is estimated that there are over 500 exhibits in all. A notable feature is - the paintings are catalogued category wise, like different time periods, by artists etc. so as to keep the interest of the visitor alive.

Getaways from Bangalore

Nandi Hills (60km)

Nandi Hill is a small hill town which houses a fortress. It is at an altitude of appx. 1500 Mtrs and thus has very salubrious climate all the year round. The fortress is in itself undergoing renovation and being readied



for the modern day traveller with food courts and all. On account of the weather it was the summer capital of Tippu Sultan the then ruler of the erstwhile Mysore province. Tippu's drop is another interesting point, where in the condemned prisoners were either pushed to or thrown to death. There are other tourist spots too like the horse way, secret escape route etc... Incidentally, the place also keeps a botanist intrigued with the local flora too.

Devanhalli Fort (40km)

In close proximity to the Nandi hills, lies the Devanhalli fort. There is history of the monument not known to many. Originally constructed over 500 years ago, by Mallabairegowda, it was with their descendants till the mid-18th century, before it went into the hands of Hyder Ali and subsequently Tippu Sultan. The place is famous as it known to be the birth place of Tipu Sultan and where a plaque is seen to joining up downstream giving the even this day inside the Fort. It has 12 semicircular bastions located almost at equal intervals. There are numerous small temples inside the vicinity of the Fort, probably indicating that religious tolerance towards all faiths existed during those times.

Bannerghatta National Park (25km)

This park came into existence in 1970 and two years later was declared as a National Park. This park is an excellent tourist spot especially for nature lovers. One of the objectives of the park was to create scope for development and study wild life. With this mind, in the year 2002 a small section of the park became a biological reserve. This national park is admired by many people both amongst the tourists who visit the city and as well as the local populace. This park houses a per corner, an animal rescue centre, a butterfly centre, an aquarium, zoo and a safari park.

Somanathapura (140km)

This is a popular temple, belonging to the thirteenth century, located some 38 Kms from Mysore, in T. Narasipurataluk. Also known as the Chenakesava temple. The temple show cases the Hoysala architecture. On account of the ancient features porttrayed by the temple, it has been nominate as a UNESCO world heritage site. The entrance to the temple has a majestic stone inscription which dwells on the history of Somanatha the creator of the shrine, who is reported to be a General under King Narasimha III. The temple has both miniature and elaborate stone carvings especially conforming to the Hoysala dynasty period. The craftsmanship created some 700 years ago, is a wonder for modern day students of archeology and architecture. This temple is located close to the Shivanasamudra water falls.

Talakadu (135km)

The town of Talakadu is located on the banks of the river Kaveri, some 45 Kms from The town of Srirangapatna has religious and the city of Mysore. The talking point of this place is, it is one a place which housed over two and half dozen temples which now lies buried under the sand. There is an interesting anecdote pertaining to the Name of the Talakadu. Legend has it that two

Kirata twin brothers named Tala and Kadu, were felling trees when they stumped up on that the same tree was being worshipped by elephants. The tree contained image of Lord Shiva and the elephants were the sages performing the ritual. Today, there exists tow stone pagados believed to be that of Tala and Kadu. In the entire complex, just one temple has been excavated which is the KirtiNarayana Temple.

Shivana Samudra Falls (140km)

A change in scenery of the Deccan plateau, where the ravines are interspersed with rocks forms the back drop of the ShivanaSamudra falls. The falls is part of the River Kaveri, when it flows through undulating ground dropping from a height to form the falls.. The width of the falls is about a thousand feet and the vertical ascent is about 350 feet. An elevated platform has been created close to the hydroelectric station for a better view of the falls. A shrine of Lord Ranganatha also exists. AdiShankara is believed to have visited this place during his preaching's. In fact, the river branches into two wings and again impression that the falls flow through an island.

Shravanabelagola (142km)

A huge monolithic statue is the attraction of this town, believed to be the world's largest monolithic statue, located near the city of Channrayapatna of Hassan district. The setting of Sharavanabelagola is spread two hills Chandragiri VVindyagiri, on the foot hills of the village. Two of the noblest men Acharya Bhadrabahu and Chandra Gupta Maurya are believed to have meditated here. This place is the home for Jain teachings for over 2300 years. A lot of inscriptions can be found ranging from the period of 600 AD to 1830 AD can be seen in Shravana Belagola especially in the Chandragiri hills, which date back beyond the 10th century. On account of the sacred significance of Shravana Belagola the Mahama staabhisheka is performed once every 12 years.

Srirangapatna (130km)

cultural significance. Even though it is a mere 15 Km away from Mysore city, it forms part of the Mandya district. The entire town is enclosed by the two tributaries of Kaveri It has religious significance as many consider the placed sacred and akin to the Triveni Sangam in the North of India. Srirangapatna gets its name from the RanganathaSwamy, making Srirangapatna one of the most important Vaishnavite pilgrimage centers of South India. The temple has shades of Hoysala and Vijaynagar era of architecture. Hyder Ali and his son Tipu Sultan were the most powerful rulers during the British regime. The Mysore Maharaja Wodeyar was defeated and is believed to be kept captive in Srirangapatna the then dejure capital of Tippu's regime. It was a cosmopolitan capital and numerous Indo Islamic structures are visible in the town notably among them being Tipu Sultan's Palace, the Darya Daulat and the Jumma Masjid.

Lepakshi (120km)

Lepakshi is a village in Andhra Pradesh State which is one of the cultural day getaways from Bangalore. Lepakshi is mainly a pilgrimage place, though it captures the attention of architecture and culture enthusiasts as well. Lepakshi is the place where Jatayu (bird) fell in a battle with Ravana (demon in Hindu mythology). Jatayu fell in the attempt to save Sita (wife of Lord Rama) from Ravana who captured her. Lord Rama, on the way to find his wife, saw Jatayuwounded from his battle and commanded it to rise. Le Pakshi literally means "rise, bird" in Telugu (the Bengaluru, the Silicon Valley of India, is a language spoken in the state of Andhra Pradesh).

Savanadurga (60km)

Savandurga lures you with its gigantic hills, lush vegetation and spectacular landscapes. There is a temple located at the foothill and a pond nearby. Go trekking, camping, rock climbing or on a biking-hiking trail and indulge your adventurous spirit! Here's a word of caution: Since the region is covered by thick vegetation, and inhabited by bears and leopards, ensure not to stay at the top after dark. Do carry essentials like water, food, a first aid kit and a survival kit in your backpack. Be careful while ascending or descending, and always move in groups.

Kolar (70km)

Explore Kolar, the erstwhile capital of the Ganga kingdom. Here you have numerous places to visit - the Kolaramma Temple, built by the Gangas and later renovated by the Cholas, Someshwara Temple built by the Cholas and expanded during the Vijayanagara period, the Koti Lingeshwara Temple dedicated to Lord Shiva which has a staggering collection of over 60 lakh Shiva Lingas and the Makbara with the graves of Haider Ali's relatives. Apart from the temples, the beautiful hillocks overlooking the town of Kolar provide ideal trekking tracks for adventure enthusiasts. Don't miss the chance to grab Kolar's reputed country blanket (Kambli) along the way.

Devarayanadurga (80km)

Here's something for the adventurer in you! Explore Devarayanadurga, and get your adrenaline pumping! Perched at a height of 1188m, amidst hills and lush forests, Devarayanadurga is an ideal spot for trekking. The major attraction of the place are the hilltop temples, the Yoganarasimha and the Bhoganarasimha, the Mahalakshmi Temple at Goravanahalli and Namada Chilume, a holy natural spring, the source of the River Jayamangali. Get a stunning panoramic view of Tumkur from atop the Devarayanadurga hill.

Sangama & Mekedatu (100km)

Located in Kanakapura Taluk, it is an ideal spot for one-day outings. Sangama is a meeting point of three rivers. From here, trek 5 km to Mekedatu, amidst dense green throughout the year. The city also hosts forest and majestic hills, while you listen to the thunderous roar of the Cauvery River, as well as the sweet chirping of birds. Karnataka State Tourism Development Corporation Limited (KSTDC) runs the Hotel MayuraSangamaMekedatu here.


